All nouns are either a person, place or thing. However, common nouns are more general. They don't refer to any single, specific thing in particular, but rather they are used in a more general sense. Examples of common nouns include: dog, city, car, amusement park, sister, holiday, day and toothpaste. Proper nouns refer to more specific people, places and things. Rather than discussing a whole class of things, like "day" or "toothpaste," they talk about something in particular. Also, proper nouns are generally always capitalized. Examples of proper nouns include Rover, New York City, Dodge Caravan, Disney World, Julie, Christmas, Monday, and Crest. Be patient when you are using common and proper noun worksheets. Learning the difference can take awhile. Although they are different, and people see both types on an almost daily basis, it still can be hard to differentiate because they are both still nouns. For more noun practice, try out these noun worksheets that cover all types of nouns. You can also check out plural noun exercises that help learners with subject-verb agreement.
